
ST. PAUL'S MISSION STATEMENT

Updates from the April Council meeting held on April 5, 2022.

Finance: Funds from savings account needed to be moved to the general fund to help cover expenses. Dorcas Society donated \$2500 to general fund; a thank you note on behalf of Finance/Council will be sent to Dorcas. Committee reviewed liability insurance renewal questionnaire and considered whether or not to increase our liability coverage and if Cyber Security should be added - recommendations to come at a later date.

Communications: Presented options regarding their search for a website hosting company and following discussion WPEngine was chosen as best option.

Worship & Music: In accordance with current CDC recommendations, the tape for social distancing will be removed from the pews and masking will be optional, but we will continue with taking communion in the pews.

Christian Education: Last day of Sunday School will be May 29th. Plans are tentative regarding Vacation Bible School.

Long Range Planning: A final draft of the church constitution has been completed and a copy will be sent to all council members for their feedback. Pastor requested that members take a look at the committee descriptions and the officer descriptions in particular.

Fellowship: Dorcas ladies will be asked if they would possibly provide coffee/breakfast snacks and a luncheon for a synod meeting at St. Paul's on May 16th and a Confirmation reception on June 5.

Head Start / Early Intervention: Classes will remain in session through the end of June. EI summer session will begin on July 5 and will be held on Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Thursdays.

Social Ministry: Committee members delivered Easter crosses.

Property: DEP will be conducting a major water inspection, including the well, holding tank in the garage and other parts of the water system.

Old Business: Discussed the upcoming May Council Elections to fill six positions; those who have agreed to run include Don Pheasant and Karen Mertz (for one-year terms) and Gail Ide, Bruce Thomas, Larry Pierce and Pat Peiffer. Delegates are still needed for the Scranton / Wilkes-Barre Mission District on-line meeting on April 27 at 7 pm, and the on-line Synod Assembly on June 10-11. WE REMEMBER

More than 150 years ago, Memorial Day took shape amid the backdrop of the U.S. Civil War. Before it ended, women began decorating the graves of fallen soldiers. In 1868, when May 30 was designated as Decoration Day, loved ones placed flowers on the graves of Union and Confederate soldiers alike.

By 1882, Decoration Day became known as Memorial Day, and soldiers who died in other wars were honored too. Over time, it became a day to remember all loved ones who have died — in war and otherwise. In 1971, Congress declared Memorial Day a national holiday to be observed on the last Monday in May. On Memorial Day, we pause to remember people who made the ultimate sacrifice for their country and for our freedom. We also pray for those who continue serving, especially those in harm's way.

RELIEF EFFORTS

In this month's issue of ELCA Global Mission's monthly newsletter, "Global Links," they report on the ELCA's work in Eastern Europe: So far, generous donors have given over \$3 million to support relief for those impacted by the crisis in Eastern Europe through Lutheran Disaster Response. Those gifts are at work in Ukraine as well as in the border countries of Poland, Slovakia, Hungary and Romania. They are providing crucial resources such as cash support for refugees; emergency items such as beds and shelter, food and clean water; protection for vulnerable individuals and groups; psychosocial care; and the prevention of sexual abuse. In a blog entry for Ash Wednesday, the Rev. Amy Reumann, senior director for ELCA Witness in Society, writes about the Putin regime's brutal invasion of Ukraine. "The valiant resistance of Ukrainian leaders, the courage of civilians fighting back and resilience of so many inhabitants are inspiring," she says. "But they do not ease my deep dismay as Russian air strikes and ground fighting continue, and civilian casualties mount." Reumann ponders the words of the prophet Joel and the question "Where is our God?" Reumann goes on to say that God is still present in the midst of war and injustice. She sees God's love in everyone around the world stepping forward in solidarity with Ukraine and especially within the church. Members of the ELCA community have responded to the crisis with prayer, advocacy and financial support through Lutheran Disaster Response. Reumann says, "In our Lutheran family, I can glimpse God's action and can testify that in the gloom and horror of war, God is here." Your gifts through the Social Ministry Committee's goodie bag collection this Lent were part of that support for LDR in Eastern Europe. Thank you.

FIXED HOURS OF PRAYER

As summer approaches, you may look forward to a more relaxed routine. But don't discard all your good habits and commitments! For soul care, try fixed hours of prayer. Simply expand the concept of praying at set times (such as before meals and bed) into praying regularly each morning, midday and evening. Set an alarm on your watch or phone and commit to engaging with God at the specified times. You can do this on your own or with family or friends.

You can pray using Scripture verses, devotional guides, the *Book of Common Prayer* or a resource such as *ExploreFaith.org*. (When I'm tired or overwhelmed, it's helpful to pray someone else's words.) You might want to pray the same prayers morning, noon and evening for a week or a month. This practice isn't meant to replace spontaneous prayers. Instead, use fixed hours of prayer to nurture a consistent habit of conversing with God.
