
ST. PAUL'S MISSION STATEMENT

Updates from the September Council meeting held on September 6, 2022.

Worship & Music: Committee recommends returning to singing parts of the liturgy, having assisting ministers writing/leading the prayers but not being robed and continuing with current format for communion. Committee also approved a suggestion to include patriotic songs in the service for Memorial Day and July 4. Possible organ repairs will be considered during budgeting for 2023.

Landscaping: Council thanked Karen and Larry for organizing several work days with Pyramid Health clients to weed and spread mulch on the church landscape beds.

Property/Finance: DAMA completed repair work on two water retention basins; Bell Tower Repair is finished; section of roof over Christian Education wing has been replaced. It was noted that more leaks have been discovered in Social Hall/Kitchen and also in Sanctuary (not associated with Bell Tower repair).

Head Start/Early Intervention: HS is currently using only one classroom because of staffing issues.

Long Range Planning: There will be a congregational meeting on Sunday, November 13 to approve changes to the church constitution. Informational meetings will be held on October 15/16 to discuss the changes.

Evangelism: Will take part in the Dallas Harvest Festival on Sunday, September 18. Purchasing a moveable vinyl labyrinth for meditation purposes. Planning to create a meditation garden near the handicapped parking lot next year and looking into ways to hold outdoor services and setting up an outdoor walking path.

Social Ministry: Collected 31 pairs of sneakers for Head Start children.

CONSTITUTION REVISION

Don't forget the short but important congregational meeting on Sunday, November 13, 10:30 am (immediately following Sunday worship). The agenda for this meeting includes only one item: the approval of amendments to our constitution. The Sunday closest to the feast day of St. Luke, called the "beloved physician" in Colossians, has become the day for our congregation to celebrate the church's

ministry of healing. We will include a Healing Service in our regular services on Saturday and Sunday, October 15 and 16. Special prayers for healing and wholeness are traditionally accompanied by laying on of hands and anointing with oil for healing.

WHERE ARE YOUR WINGS?

A note of appreciation for Pastor Grube from his biggest fan.

Sunday, August 28, marked Charles' 25th year as Pastor of St. Paul's and our church celebrated with words from a number of speakers. Thank you for your support of Pastor Grube and our family.

This note is to express my own appreciation of him as a pastor to and with a community. Charles is someone I would seek as a pastor. He is firmly set in sound doctrine with faithful, substantiated theology. He is fundamentally a scholar of scriptures, ever since I heard him conjugating Greek verbs in seminary. I knew he was one who delves deep into scripture. He was awarded honors in New Testament during his studies. I am fortunate to have him as a walking Bible reference book for all my inquiries. He holds a second master's degree in church architecture which indicates his curiosity and discipline as a scholar.

Charles teaches Bible studies, confirmation and first communion and has mentored six seminarians seeking ordination as an internship supervisor. He is in demand as an associate to our synod's bishop.

His humility, integrity, intelligence, patience, listening ear, even temperament, confidence and musicality all contribute to faithful worship conduct. His relationships with the very young children, his respect for young people, his esteem for adults and his kindness and care for our elders are heartwarming. We fortunate ones get to see how his quiet strength supports others.

ALL SAINTS' DISPLAY NOV. 5TH & 6TH

We are preparing a collection of photos for All Saints' Sunday. As in past displays, we will include photos of church members who have died this year. We will also include photos of the newly baptized members. These photos will be displayed on a table in the narthex. During the liturgy, names of those who have died this year and names of those who have been baptized this year will be remembered out loud in prayer.

We become saints with Jesus in our baptisms. When celebrating All Saints' Day in the church, we remember all God's saints: those baptized, and especially those who have died. We describe the great homecoming in the new Jerusalem "where every tear will be wiped away." The autumn image of bounty, as in harvest, brings forth the image of the dead as God's harvest gathered as the treasures of heaven.

We invite you to bring a photo of any loved one who has died to add to the display in the narthex. You can include loved ones who died many years ago, images of Saints from old, and historic church leaders. Please bring a framed photo and include a label with the name of the departed. While the prayers at church that weekend will include the names of the saints who have died this year only, the narthex display will include the faithfully departed of many years.

Please bring your framed photos to the church office from October 30th to November 4th. You may take your photo home after the November 6th service.
