Updates from the October Council meeting held on October 4, 2022.

Communication: Facebook postings were placed to promote the fall Rummage/Bake Sale and also the Blessing of the Animals. Newspaper articles also promoting these two events were submitted.

Landscaping: Council thanked Karen Mertz and Larry Pierce for working with Pyramid Health Care clients to mulch the landscaping beds. Fertilizer was added to some areas of the lawn and Carol will coordinate the winterizing of the sprinkler system.

Worship & Music: Will have a Holden Evening Prayer service on Tuesday, December 6 at 7:00 pm. Christmas Eve services will be held at 4 & 7 pm; the 4:00 pm service will also be available via Zoom. Christmas Day falls on a Sunday and the regular 9:30 am service will be held.

Christian Education: Sunday School students will decorate pumpkins for homebound members; Social Ministry Committee will deliver them. On October 30 there will be a bonfire in place of Sunday School with emphasis on fire safety. In November there will be a Turkey Decorating Event with members of the congregation voting for their favorite "Turkey" by bringing canned goods for the Back Mountain Food Pantry. No Sunday School on December 25 and January 1.

Long Range Planning: Scott Schukraft will be leading two informational meetings on the revisions to the church constitution on Saturday, October 15 and Sunday, October 16, immediately following each service.

Evangelism: Gail Ide thanked everyone who assisted with the display at the Dallas Harvest Festival. Gail is also working on setting up an opportunity for council members, committee

members and prayer group members to try using the new moveable labyrinth before inviting the congregation and public to try it out.

Health Ministry: Two personal visits were made, three phone calls placed and 10 cards were sent out to members. Tissue packets have been placed in the sanctuary pews.

Social Ministry: Committee continues to support the clients of Pyramid Health Care; an Advent Tree will be in place for the collection of donations to benefit World Hunger and the Lutheran Disaster Response; also a Mitten Tree will be featured again this year for donations of hats/scarfs/gloves/mittens & socks with items being given to Head Start families.

Finance: Committee chairpersons are being asked to review their budget requirements for 2023 and submit recommendations to the committee by October 25.

Old Business: New Sunday School Teachers need to complete their background checks; and it was suggested a link to the synod's resource page for clearance forms be placed on the church website.

New Business: Following discussion on the lack of interested members who are able and willing to do the highway cleanup and because of the concern of tick bites, it was voted unanimously not to renew the Adopt-A-Highway Contract which is up for renewal in November.

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DORCAS REPORT

At the October Dorcas meeting, president Chris Bellezza thanked all those who assisted with the successful fall Rummage/Bake Sale.

The group discussed some ideas to improve the spring sale and set the 2023 rummage sale dates: May 5-6 and October 6-7, 2023. This year's Christmas luncheon will be held on Tuesday, December 13 at noon at Apple Tree Terrace at Newberry Estate, Dallas. The December hostesses are working on the menu and will soon have a sign-up sheet posted in the narthex. All women of the congregation are invited to attend.

The group also voted to hold its January, February and March meetings at 1:00 pm at the church. Dorcas officers will remain the same for 2023. The group will cover the cost of restuffing the cushions on the red chairs in the Narthex, and voted to give \$5,000 to the church for its general fund.

The next meeting will be held on Tuesday, November 8 at 7:00 p.m. and the hostesses will be Dianna Smith, Cathy Ridout and Marissa Miller. All women of the congregation are encouraged to attend.

The first Sunday on or after November 1, All Saints' Day, is our congregational celebration of All Saints. We remember both those who have died and those who have been baptized in the past year in our prayers and celebrate the cloud of witnesses of our own community with pictures in a display in the narthex. As All Saints begins our month, the end of the liturgical year is marked two weeks later, November 20, with the celebration of the reign of Christ over all creation as Christ the King. This is our final day of the church year calendar and this year's concentration on Luke's gospel. We always rely on Luke to tell the Christmas story, of course, but our new year attention will come to focus on Matthew's gospel.

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The annual Bishop's Conference for ministers of the Northeastern PA Synod will be this month, November 14-15 in Allentown. "On The Beat

First Sunday of Advent, November 27

Advent is the New Year of the church, and this year, Advent begins the last Sunday of this month, November 27. This season of waiting, watching, counting, and anticipating usually comes with special congregational resources for marking time and celebrating the season. This year is no exception. In addition to the regular Word in Season daily devotion resource, we will be providing a special Advent season booklet for daily devotions at home centered on a reflection written about a scripture reading for each day of Advent, except Sundays. The children will have their own daily project to work on through the season, constructing a paper chain, with one link added each day. Each link will offer a brief scripture passage and a reflection, activity, or family discussion topic. And for us all, we will have a special midweek evening gathering Tuesday, December 6, for singing Holden Evening Prayer, the setting of Evening Prayer we have come to enjoy over several years of using it for Lent midweek prayer.

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CHRISTMAS SERVICES

We're really looking ahead here, but since Christmas Eve and Christmas Day fall on a Saturday and Sunday this year, the Worship and Music committee looked ahead, too, and has announced our Christmas worship schedule. Saturday, Christmas Eve, we will worship at 4:00 and 7:00 pm; the 4:00 service will be livestreamed on Zoom, and there will be no 5:30 pm service that Saturday. We will have a simple service of Lesson and Carols with Holy Communion on Sunday, Christmas Day at 9:30 am, and there will be no Sunday School.





SOCIAL MINISTRY UPDATE


