
#### ST. PAUL'S MISSION STATEMENT



Updates from the November Council meeting held on November 1, 2022.

Synod has announced a July 2023 trip to Slovenia open to church youth; please contact Pastor for more information.

There will be a Holden evening worship service on Tuesday, Dec. 6 at 7:00 pm, and the December Council meeting will be held following the service; Christmas Eve services will be held at 4:00 pm (also on Zoom) and 7:00 pm.

The Social Ministry committee will set up a mitten tree near the Social Hall and members are invited to decorate it with warm mittens/gloves, hats and scarves (and socks) for the Head Start and Early Intervention children. This year the Advent Giving Tree will be placed in the church foyer to collect donations for the ELCA's World Hunger and Disaster Relief efforts. The committee also will be sending Thanksgiving cards to our shut-ins, and will invite our Sunday School students to decorate our Narthex Christmas tree with Chrismons.

The Finance committee is working on finalizing the church budget for 2023.

The January Annual Meeting will be held on Sunday, January 15; committee, Brotherhood & Dorcas reports are due in the church office no later than December 28.

Property committee plans to work with Brotherhood in cleaning out unneeded items in the garage & shed; plumbing & electrical issues in restrooms and Sanctuary will be addressed.

Annual Giving Statements

IRS regulations state that for tax purposes, you must be sure your contributions are received no later than December 31. After that date, 2022 contributions

received by St. Paul's in 2023 may be credited to your financial statements only if they are mailed and postmarked in 2022. The IRS also requires that taxpayers receive their financial statement acknowledgments before the date he/she files a tax return. If the taxpayer does not have the acknowledgment by then, the taxpayer cannot claim a charitable deduction.

## Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

Advent is as clear an example as any of just how complex the Christian faith can be. Many churches for whom faith is black and white don't even bother with it.

Advent is for waiting and watching for Jesus to come. Placed as it is before Christmas, we naturally think of his coming as a baby born in Bethlehem in history's past. Waiting for something that happened 2000 years ago has its own complexity. But we begin the season by turning our attention to Jesus' second coming at the end of time to judge, to save and redeem us, and to bring all God's promises to completion. Jesus clearly calls us to be vigilant for that coming, but we're still waiting 2000 years later. Living in such ambiguity on a promise in this meantime is another complexity to our faith. But the real zinger is the truth that while we wait and watch for Jesus to come throughout time, Jesus is also already truly present with us. He is with us in the word read, preached, prayed, and shared in the community. He is with us through the sacraments of communion, baptism, and in forgiveness. He is with us in the love, care, and charity shared among neighbors. And he is with us in the Holy Spirit of God dwelling in us.

Like being fully saint and sinner, like being fully human and fully divine, or like bad things happening to good people, Advent is another experience of our faith that reminds us that if someone has made it all simple and black and white, there's something missing. Faith is rich and complex, deep and experiential, thought-provoking and heart-filling. It's why we do it best together in community. May you have a rich, fulfilling, and blessed Advent.

We mark this Advent season as we usually do with booklets for your home devotional reading and prayer and a special paper chain devotional for children. Evening Prayer is a collection of prayers and canticles Christians have long used to mark the end of the day. Holden Evening Prayer has set those canticles to music composed by popular church composer Marty Haugen for the Holden Retreat community in Washington state, and it has become very popular among us since we introduced it for Lent midweek prayer over six years ago. #### **INVITATION TO TRY...**

Have you ever been curious about labyrinths? Labyrinths are circular paths used by many different faiths for prayer and contemplation, and have been part of religious practices since the early days of Greek civilization. Walking a labyrinth can be a very calming, meditative and relaxing experience. St. Paul's now has a moveable labyrinth, and you are invited to try it out! On Sunday, December 4, immediately after service, the labyrinth will be on display in the church Narthex. Gail Ide, of the evangelism and health ministry committees, will be on hand to guide members through Walking the Labyrinth and to describe the benefits of labyrinth walking. To keep the surface of the labyrinth clean, please wear socks—no shoes.



As usual, we will mark the Christmas season with some special worship celebrations. We begin on the Fourth Sunday of Advent, December 18, with a

special program by our Sunday School children called "Living Word." The following Saturday, Christmas Eve, we will worship at 4 and 7 pm with holy communion and candlelight. The 4:00 service will be live streamed on Zoom, and our Birthday Party for Jesus will follow that 4:00 pm service. There will be no 5:30 pm service that Saturday. The next day, Sunday, Christmas Day, we will celebrate with a simple service of Lesson and Carols with Holy Communion at 9:30 am, and there will be no Sunday School. The following weekend, we will return to our regular worship schedule with services Saturday at 5:30 pm and Sunday at 9:30 am as we celebrate the seventh and eighth days of Christmas. There will be no Sunday School January 1.



Our weekly Bible Study, The Bible This Week, will resume after the Christmas season break on Tuesday, January 10. We meet on Tuesday mornings, 10:30 to 11:30 am, and share our thoughts and reflections on the readings for the coming week's worship. With the new year of the church, our attention will shift from Luke's gospel as our primary gospel for the year to Matthew, with its themes of righteousness, the Kingdom of Heaven, Jesus' teaching, and the fulfillment of the Old Testament scriptures. You'll find the readings for the coming week's worship in the worship bulletin and on our web site. But whether or not you read them ahead of time, you are always very welcome to join the conversation.

#### **COLLABORATION ACROSS TIME & PLACE**

For Christmas Day worship, many churches use Psalm 98. It is fitting, then, that Isaac Watts, who interpreted 132 psalms as hymn texts, based a now-beloved carol on it.

Watts (1674-1748) was a student of language, religion and philosophy. He wanted to make Scripture more relevant to lay people and thought hymns could help. Watts composed more than 600 hymn texts, many still in use. But Psalm 98:4-9, "Joy to the World," needed music to fit its words.

Enter Lowell Mason (1792-1872), an American choir director. He came across Watts' Psalm 98 hymn text and sought inspiration for a melody from the famous oratorio *Messiah* by George F. Handel (1685-1759). Mason pulled musical phrases from sections of Handel's work, resulting in the tune we now recognize as "Joy to the World."

So it is that three men who lived across three centuries and never met — along with the composer of the original psalm more than two millennia earlier — together produced a hymn to the Christ-child, which millions have sung and continue to love.

National Institute of Medicine's (NIH) National Center for Complementary and Integrative Health (NCCIH) reminds people that "Natural doesn't necessarily mean safer, or better; Medications and supplements can interact." Two very important issues.

I find it extremely important for everyone to know where to find out information on herbs, supplements and complementary modalities (even the Healing Touch that I do)!!! One very reliable site is PubMed. Here you will find publications related to your search. For example, put in the herb, Echinacea, in the search box when you go to PubMed at <a href="mailto:pubmed.ncbi.nlm.nih.gov">pubmed.ncbi.nlm.nih.gov</a>. Press the Search button. Over one thousand articles appear of which many are free.

While thinking of looking things up, everyone should check the Consumer Products Safety Commission (CPSC) to check for recalls on many products from baby items to toys to adult merchandise to BBQ grills for your grilling chef; all at <a href="www.cpsc.gov/recalls">www.cpsc.gov/recalls</a>. In fact, I just saw one for Generac generators. You can sign up for specific subjects.

Sorry, everyone, I couldn't resist this from the Washington Post via MedPageToday/Morning News from Nov. 9: *Please, Stop Licking Toads.*Apparently, some people in some western/southern states are licking toads that give off potent psychedelic toxic secretions for hallucinogenic enlightenment! ## TASTY CREATIONS

Make this yummy treat to remember what happened on each day of Creation.

#### What you need:

- 6 large pretzel rods
- Candy melts (white, chocolate and blue)
- Green sprinkles
- · White or star-shaped sprinkles
- Fish crackers
- Animal crackers
- Adult help



#### What you do:

- With help, melt the three colors of candy melts in separate dishes. Microwave for 30 seconds at a time, stirring until soft.
- Decorate one pretzel for each day of Creation:
  - Dip half in white and half in chocolate to show light and darkness.
  - Dip half in white and half in blue to show separation of the atmosphere.
  - Dip half in chocolate, add green sprinkles and dip half in blue to show land, plants and water.
  - Dip in chocolate and add white or star sprinkles to show the stars.
  - Dip in blue and add fish crackers to show sea life.
  - Dip in chocolate and add animal crackers to show land animals.
