
ST. PAUL'S MISSION STATEMENT



Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

Through these final weeks of this season after Epiphany, we hear passages from Jesus' Sermon on the Mount from Matthew's gospel, and it gets more and more obvious with each successive week how the ways of the kingdom of heaven, or God's ways for our living, contradict the ways of our world. Our priorities, our relationships, our goals and our perspectives in this world make most of what Jesus teaches sound impossible to fulfill, especially when we think of real-life implications and applications. And Jesus pulls no punches when he summarizes individual teachings with lines like, "Unless your righteousness exceeds that of the scribes and Pharisees, you will never enter the kingdom of heaven," and "Be perfect, therefore, as your heavenly Father is perfect."

Yet, by our baptism into his death, God's claim on us as child and heir, and our calling as disciple of Jesus, we are as firmly planted in that kingdom of heaven as we are the world. And by God's grace and the power of the Holy Spirit, we actually can and do live according to Jesus' teaching. It's not easy, but that's why we are joined to a community of disciples, the church, where we can live and obey and serve and minister together. May God continue to bless our community in all the ways we live according to the kingdom of heaven.

WEEKLY BIBLE STUDY

ASSEMBLY UPDATE

At the 2022 Churchwide Assembly last August, voting members adopted a memorial concerning restructuring the ELCA's governance. In November the ELCA Church Council responded to this by authorizing the establishment of a Commission for a Renewed Lutheran Church (CRLC). Nominations for the commission are being accepted through March 9. CONSTITUTION UPDATE

At our annual meeting in January, we ratified our revised congregational constitution

according to the ELCA model constitution for congregations. The final step to its official adoption was a review by the Synod. We have received that review, made the few editorial corrections provided, and will begin to operate under the new constitution June 1, 2023. In his comments about the review, Rev. Dr. D. Michael Bennethum, the Senior Advisor to the Bishop and reviewer of our constitution commented, “This is one of the best prepared updates of congregational governing documents that I have seen over the past nine years! Please commend all who were involved.” The committee involved in the revision work deserving that commendation included Scott Schukraft, Carol Fett, John Waschek, Don Pheasant, Frank Mariano and Pastor Grube. The most noticeable change to our governance is that we will have one congregational meeting in January to receive the bulletin of reports and approve a budget as we have, but also to elect congregation council members. We have had this election at worship in May, and we will do that for one final time this coming May, but thereafter, we will hold our council elections at our regular January meeting.



EPIPHANY TO LENT

Because the date of Easter is set according to the lunar and solstice calendar, and Lent is fixed at 40 days before Easter, and because Epiphany is a fixed date (January 6), the season after Epiphany is a flexible season with varying numbers of Sundays, depending on the start of Lent. This year, there are seven Sundays after Epiphany, ending with the feast of Transfiguration February 19. Ash Wednesday, the beginning of Lent, is February 22.



PALMS FOR ASHES

Palms requested – If you kept your palms from last year’s Palm Sunday service, please bring them to the church by **Sunday, February 12**. In keeping with tradition, palms from the previous year are burned on Transfiguration to make the ashes to be used on Ash Wednesday.



OUR LENTEN PLANS

Lent begins this month with Ash Wednesday on February 22. As usual, we will mark this Lent season with special components in our worship, special resources for your prayer and devotion at home, and special gatherings for the community. The details of that last component – special gatherings – are still to be determined, so be watching for announcements about what they will be in bulletins and online.



SYNOD NEWS

With the retirement of long-time Associate of the Bishop and ELCA Director for Evangelical Mission (DEM) Rev. Dr. D. Michael Bennethum, the Northeastern PA Synod has been partnering with the ELCA in a search and call process to select a new DEM. The synod has recently announced that Deacon Kathleen (Kat) Tigerman is our new DEM. She currently serves as co-director of a spiritual retreat center in Minnesota, and will come to northeastern Pa. to begin her new position in April. We welcome Deacon Tigerman to Northeastern Pennsylvania Synod!

The Northeastern Pa. Synod Assembly this year, “Going Beyond,” will be big! We will return to an in-person assembly at Kalahari Resort, Pocono Manor, June 1-3. We will conduct very important business for the life of the synod, including electing a new Vice-President (the senior-most lay leader of the synod) and a new Secretary. We will be led in inspiring worship by David Scherer, otherwise known as Agape, who has performed several times at St. Paul’s and the ELCA Youth Gathering over the years, and Joe Davis, a spoken word poet who has also performed at the Youth Gathering and whose play, “Living Word,” was our Sunday School Christmas program this year. And the assembly planners are holding their breath while the final arrangements are being made for a special guest preacher for the festival worship. 

MISSION NEWS

January's ELCA *Global Links* reports: At the Young Adults in Global Mission (YAGM) orientation, Sol Namir was introduced to the Senegalese value of Mjaboot: "the responsibility to care for your family." When Sol first learned about the concept, she figured Senegalese people practiced Mjaboot out of a sense of courtesy and obligation. However, over the first few months of her YAGM year in Senegal, she developed a different understanding. "When I'm not home at my usual arrival time, my host father calls and asks if I'm OK and on my way," she writes in a recent newsletter. "When I felt sick, my host mother kept on checking that I was doing OK." This past Thanksgiving, Sol missed being with her family in Puerto Rico, but she was grateful for her new connection with her host family in Senegal: "We are building our relationship." Sol belongs to the first YAGM cohort to enter service since the COVID-19 pandemic began in 2019. She and her fellow volunteers are now walking alongside communities around the world, and the YAGM team is recruiting its next group of volunteers, to enter service in 2023. Thank you for your support of ELCA Global Mission and the life- and perspective-changing experience it is for young adults of our church who serve as YAGM's around the world.
