
#### ST. PAUL'S MISSION STATEMENT

#### **SYNOD NEWS**

While our Lutheran church has ordained women as pastors for over fifty years, on Jan. 22, Sally Azar became the first woman ordained in the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Jordan and the Holy Land (ELCJHL). She was ordained by its bishop, her father, Bishop Sani Azar. She was educated in Syria, then in Germany, and served as a Council member of the Lutheran World Federation. She was ordained in the Lutheran Church of the Redeemer in Jerusalem, and will serve in the ELCJHL English-speaking congregation in Jerusalem while working to bridge that congregation with the Arabic-speaking congregation nearby. "With my ordination," she says, "I hope that not only young women are inspired to pursue theology but that women of all ages who may have wanted to study theology but didn't think it was possible will be encouraged to do so." ELCA Presiding Bishop Elizabeth Eaton participated in the ordination service, along with 18 of the ELCA's synod bishops and leaders.

#### **MIDWEEK LENTEN GATHERINGS**

Our weekly mid-week Lent gatherings take a different form this year from our traditional Wednesday evening supper and scripture times. We will gather this year around our regular Tuesday late morning Lectionary Bible Study at 10:30 am, then gather in fellowship with our own brown-bag lunches from 11:30 am to 12:15 pm. We'll end our time together with a short prayer service finishing at 12:30 pm. The readings are printed in our bulletin and online each week, so you can read ahead if you like, but that is not necessary. You can come for any or all of the portions of our gathering, according to your own schedule. And you can still gather Wednesday evenings for soup and scripture beginning at 6:00 pm with our ecumenical partners. We host the event March 22, but see the separate article for the schedule and location of gatherings throughout March.



Last year we were able to send two of our children to Bear Creek Camp for their first experience of camp thanks to your support of the fundraiser Kendra Brosious and her family sponsored. It was a great summer to be part of the camp. Bear Creek Camp reported that they hosted 750 overnight campers representing 184 congregations led by 38 summer staff members and 7 staff-in-training (including Kendra). That's a huge impact, and a life-changing experience for many. Thank you for your continuing support of Bear Creek Camp. Hi Everyone,

At our Annual Meeting, it was asked where our first aid kits and the AED are located. If coming in our main front doors, go to the right into the hallway towards the Social Hall. On the wall on the right, you will see a glass encased box. In it you will see a clearly marked AED case and above the AED is the clearly marked First Aid kit. This glass-encased box is not locked. The second First Aid kit is in the kitchen on the shelf above the "wash hands only" sink to the right of the stoves. In the freezer (immediately on the right inside the pantry in the kitchen) you will find homemade, disposable ice packs similar to those used by some schools. Thanks, Cathy. There's a note posted on the freezer door with directions. PLEASE, please, if you use anything from the kits let Cathy, me, or the church staff know, so they can be replaced!



#### **WOUNDED HEALERS**

"Nobody escapes being wounded," writes Henri Nouwen. "We all are wounded people, whether physically, emotionally, mentally or spiritually. The main question is not 'How can we hide our wounds?' so we don't have to be embarrassed, but 'How can we put our woundedness in the service of others?' When our wounds cease to be a source of shame, and become a source of healing, we have become wounded healers." He continues, "Jesus is God's wounded healer: through his wounds we are healed. Jesus' suffering and death brought joy and life. His humiliation brought glory; his rejection brought a community of love. As followers of Jesus, we can also allow our wounds to bring healing to others."

How might viewing Jesus as a wounded healer affect your relationship with him? What roles have wounds and healing played in your own faith life? How can you minister to other people from a place of brokenness?
