
ST. PAUL'S MISSION STATEMENT

Updates from the September 5 meeting:

Pastor's Report: The council watched a recording of Bishop deForest's speech during the NEPA Synod summer meeting and discussed strategies for sharing that information with the congregation. Members of the Long-Range Planning committee will meet to continue the discussion.

Christian Education Committee: Sunday School classes will return on Rally Day, Sept. 10. The SS calendar includes Bonfire Day, Oct. 29; Turkey Decorating, Nov. 5 and 12, and voting with food items for Best Turkey on Nov. 19; Preparing for Advent, Nov. 26; and SS Children's Christmas Program, Dec. 17.

Evangelism Committee: St. Paul's will take part in the Dallas Harvest Festival on Sunday, September 17. Gail Ide will attend a Reconciling with Christ session on Nov. 4. Don Kretchmer and Joe Hardisky are working on clearing the walking path around the church property and are looking for assistance to remove downed trees. They plan to ask the Boy Scout troop meeting at the church to help with path maintenance.

Health Ministry Committee: Cathy Ridout and Gail Ide have contacted a local CPR trainer about providing classes in CPR and AED use at the church. They are working on developing a schedule for classes.

Social Ministry Committee: The Social Ministry Committee will have a series of projects beginning in September with a Sneakers for Head Start collection, "God's Work. Our Hands." project, Harvest Home celebration, and a collection for the SPCA.

MISSION NEWS

Some transitions have taken place recently among our Scranton/Wilkes-Barre Mission District churches. Good

Shepherd, Wilkes-Barre and Holy Trinity, Kingston have formed a Yoked Ministry agreement and are scheduled for congregational meetings to extend a call to Pastor Wes Poole as pastor of the joint parish. Pastor Poole currently serves both congregations, one as called pastor and one under contract. Meanwhile, Pastor Mary Owens has resigned as pastor of St. Matthew United, Scranton to accept a new call. St. Matthew's is served in the interim by Father Dan Fitzsimmons, a retired Episcopal priest, as they complete the process for a new pastoral call. Finally, at the end of this month, St. Luke, Archbald will celebrate its 175th anniversary with a special liturgy and dinner. Remember all these congregations in your prayers during these important moments in their lives and ministry.

The ELCA Global Mission monthly newsletter, "Global Links," recently shared these stories. Since the Russia-Ukraine War began in February 2022, over 1.4 million refugees have arrived in Poland and registered to stay there — more than in any other country.

Several Lutheran churches are providing support for them, including the Evangelical Church of the Augsburg Confession in Poland. This is the church Kornelia Rudkowska, an International Women Leaders scholarship recipient, calls home. Last year her mother, Katarzyna, became one of the first nine Lutheran women to be ordained in Poland. Katarzyna is local director of the "I Overcome Barriers" program, which helps Ukrainian refugees master the Polish language.

"Refugees, despite the fact that they often have high professional qualifications, do not find work," Kornelia says. "The biggest barrier is the poor knowledge of the Polish language." The project is supported by the Lutheran World Federation and contributions from member churches and institutions, including Newberry College (South Carolina), where Kornelia is a sophomore. Meanwhile, Lutheran Disaster Response and Lutheran World Relief are partnering on a \$1 million grant to help fund the project Supporting Farmers to Restore Resilient Livelihoods in Kharkiv, Ukraine. Participants in newly liberated areas of Ukraine are receiving input depending upon their needs, whether that be restoring old farms or establishing new ones.

HEALING SERVICE SCHEDULED

St. Luke, in addition to being commemorated as the evangelist who wrote the gospel attributed to him, is noted in Colossians (4:14) to be "the beloved

REPORT FROM THE LWF

The Lutheran World Federation (LWF) recently concluded its 13th Assembly, "One Body, One Spirit, One Hope," Sept. 13-19 in Krakow, Poland. The Assembly elected Danish Bishop Henrik Stubkjær as the new President of the LWF, succeeding outgoing President Archbishop Dr Panti Filibus Musa, Nigerian Archbishop of the Lutheran Church of Christ in Nigeria. And, LWF's Estonian General Secretary Rev. Dr Anne Burghardt and the Roman Catholic Prefect of the Vatican's Dicastery for Promoting Christian Unity (DPCU) Cardinal Kurt Koch presented the *Common Word* to the Assembly.

This shared reflection between Catholics and Lutherans, preparing for the 500th anniversary of the Augsburg Confession in 2030, "could lead to another 'milestone' on the way from conflict to communion, comparable to the landmark Joint Declaration on the Doctrine of Justification" of 1999.

FIRST COMMUNION TRAINING

It is our congregation's tradition to celebrate First Communion for our younger members on Reformation Sunday. We



will gather with those beginning school or sharing interest in receiving Holy Communion along with their parents on Saturday, October 28, 10:00 am-12 noon, to introduce our young members to Holy Communion and train them for receiving it. They will receive their first communion in worship that weekend.

You can include loved ones who died many years ago, images of saints from old, and historic church leaders. Please bring a framed photo and include a label with the name of the departed. While the prayers at church that weekend will include the names of the saints who have died this year only, the Narthex display will include the faithfully departed of many years.

Please bring your framed photos to the church office from October 29 to November 3. You may take your photo home after the November 5 service.
