Updates from the November meeting:

Property Committee : During the November 7 meeting, Council approved the Property Committee's quote for the Simplex Fire Panel for repairs to the alarms/strobe lights and wiring, and reviewed the two quotes for the sanctuary roof repairs. However, additional information needs to be received on one quote before a final decision can be made. Building gutters are also scheduled to be cleaned.

Finance Committee: The proposed 2024 budget was presented by the Finance Committee and will be presented to the congregation at the January Annual Meeting, January 21, 2024. A Temple Talk will be held December 2/3 in regard to church finances.

Christian Education Committee: The Sunday School children decorated pumpkins which were delivered by the Social Ministry Committee to shut-in members. Christian Education Committee is planning a Turkey Decorating Contest to benefit the Back Mountain Food Pantry, as well as an Advent Event on November 26; no Sunday School December 24 and 31.

Annual Meeting: Council elections will be held in January 21, 2024 at the Annual Meeting – four positions need to be filled for three-year terms and one position for a two-year term.

NEW NATIVITY SCENE

Now that the season of Advent is here, it is time to unveil our church's new Nativity scene!

The old scene, which had been used for decades, had finally succumbed to the winter elements, and it was time for a new display. Just as we wait and watch for the coming of Christ throughout Advent, so the scene will expand with new figures throughout the month of December.

The figures are made of heavy, weatherresistant metal and are painted to look threedimensional; the high-resolution paint is longlasting and resists fading. The colorful and highly detailed figures fold up for compact storage.

ADVENT CELEBRATIONS

We celebrate this Advent and Christmas season with special worship events this



month. We count down the four Sundays of Advent with Advent candles as usual, this year placed at the baptismal font.

The Saturday, December 9 Advent 2 service will be a special service incorporating the beloved Holden Evening Prayer service with Holy Communion. And since December 24 is both the fourth and final Sunday of Advent and Christmas Eve, it will be a full day of worship and celebration. We'll celebrate Advent 4 that Saturday at 5:30 pm and Sunday morning at 9:30 as usual. Then we'll celebrate our Christmas Eve services at 4:00 and 7:00 pm. The 4:00 pm service will be streamed live on our Zoom channel.

The following weekend we'll celebrate the First Sunday of Christmas with our traditional service of Lessons and Carols Saturday and Sunday, December 30/31. Come and worship!

You think Bear Creek Camp is just a summer camp? Their November newsletter reported, "in the span of just thirty-six hours, our high ropes course hosted 63 fifth graders and their chaperones on an overnight school field trip, 12 college students participating in a retreat with their campus ministry, and 20 men on their annual church retreat. And that's just one weekend in October."

The high ropes course, built in 2013, is a popular destination at Bear Creek Camp, including ziplining to the flying squirrel, crate stacking, the giant's ladder, the leap of faith, and the high course. This past year, the high ropes course has had over 1000 participants.

And coming in January is Winter Connect! This camp, for 4th-12th-graders takes place January 12-14, 2024. The Latin cross is the simplest and most common form of the Christian cross, possibly dating from the second or third century. Roman Catholic and Orthodox Christians typically display a crucifix — an image of Jesus hanging on the cross — to remember his death for the sake of the world. Protestant churches often favor the empty cross, commemorating Jesus' resurrection.
