



Updates from the June 4, 2024 meeting:

Worship and Music Committee: Considering holding an outdoor worship service this summer at Frances Slocum State park, but no pavilions are available this year; committee will consider this idea again for next year.

Christian Education Committee: Working on choosing dates for Vacation bible School, either three consecutive days in July or one Sunday in July and one in August; also contacting Prince of Peace Church to see if there is interest in a joint VBS. Rally Day will be held on Sunday, September 15.

Health Ministry Committee: Six members attended the recent AED/CPR training session.

Head Start/Early Intervention:

Last day for Head Start was Friday, June 14. The Early Intervention program will be moving their classrooms and Speech Therapy program this coming fall to Misericordia University and will not be renewing its contract with St. Paul's; this will cause a \$32,000 drop in revenue for the church.

Finance/Property Committee: Risk Inspector for our Property Liability Insurance carrier (Erie Insurance) toured the building with a few recommendations: Cardboard boxes should not be stored in the electrical room; no deep fat frying in the kitchen; replace water damaged ceiling tiles in Christian Education wing; keep organ chamber walkway clear and accessible at all times. Committee is still searching for a kit or fabricator to build a new railing for the predella. The piano in the choir room needs extensive maintenance costing upwards of \$1500.

Staff Support: Council approved summer office hours – Monday thru Thursday will remain the same (9:30 am till 4:00 pm) but the office will be closed on Fridays.

Council discussed a Lake Lehman senior high student plan to complete her graduation project by holding a three-day Summer Day Camp, July 10, 11, and 12 from 9:30 am till 3:00 pm., for second and third graders. She is now in the process of sending out flyers, looking for volunteer helpers and soliciting funds from local businesses to help cover expenses.

Council also discussed the NEPA Synod's 6-2-6-1 program which is intended to bring six congregations into partnership and sharing leadership, ministry and life. Council is working through the program to see how it could help support our church's ministries and work in our community and will share the results with the congregation when finished.

THE POWER OF WARMTH

In one of Aesop's fables, the North Wind and the Sun debated who was stronger. When they saw a traveler approaching, the Sun sensed an opportunity. He said whoever could make the man remove his coat would win — and even let the Wind go first.

So the Sun ducked behind a cloud as the Wind began blowing mighty blasts of air at the traveler. But the harder the Wind blew, the closer the man pulled his coat around himself. Finally, the Wind gave up in despair.

Then the Sun emerged and smiled down on the traveler. Feeling the gentle rays, the man soon found it too hot to walk with his coat on. He felt so warm he removed one garment after another and bathed in a nearby stream.

The Sun knew that warmth, friendliness and a gentle touch are always stronger than fury and force.

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100th ANNIVERSARY "FUN FACT"

By June 1925, a Ladies Auxiliary was formed. Determined to raise funds for furniture and supplies, they began their 46-year tradition of service. What could they do to raise money? They baked - thousands of pasties, sweet rolls, and doughnuts. They sold tea towels and dish cloths and bottles of vanilla. Later, their baked goods would appear in Wally Gosart's grocery store on the corner of Main and Center Streets in Shavertown. For these wives and mothers, home and church were the heart of their social lives. and with as much laughter as hard work they rolled up their sleeves and set out to build St. Paul's. In times of financial crisis, the first question asked was "How much is in the Ladies Auxiliary treasury?" In fact, in 1934, at the height of the Depression, these down-to-earth homemakers made a gift of \$4,888 to the church, an astonishing sum for those hard times. Also in June of 1925, the new congregation of St. Paul's had bought some land, the property of George Travis on the corner of Main and Franklin Streets in Shavertown. It was a wonderful location: Main Street, a wide, well-packed dirt thoroughfare, was *the* main street from Trucksville to Dallas, busy with cars, horse-drawn carts, and farmers' wagons. The trolley car ran behind the church where route 309 now lies, its route stretching from Wilkes-Barre all the way to Harveys Lake. It was a location people would notice and could get to easily. ELCA YOUTH GATHERING

After the disruption of the Covid-19 pandemic that postponed, then canceled the 2021 Gathering, the ELCA Youth Gathering is back this summer meeting in New Orleans at the Smoothie King Center (the NBA arena next door to the Super Dome). Created to Be will be held July 16-20, 2024, and this event will include a Young Adult Gathering in addition to the usual Youth Gathering. This will give those who were not able to attend a Gathering because of the pandemic cancellation a chance to experience a Gathering, even if it is from an older perspective. We have had youth attend every Gathering since 2006 in San Antonio, Texas, including Kendra Brosious's intended attendance at the 2021 Gathering in Minneapolis. But for the first time since then, we have no youth attending this Gathering. It is a life-changing event for many, and you can watch it unfold. 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SYNOD ASSEMBLE UPDATE

The first fully hybrid Northeastern PA Synod Assembly, "Hungry for Life Together in Christ," was held at Atonement Lutheran Church, Wyomissing and online on Saturday, June 8. Ray Mancke traveled to Wyomissing to attend in person while Gail Ide and Pastor Grube joined the assembly online. The host congregation's pastor and musicians planned and led the Holy Communion worship that began the assembly, and lunch was provided by the staff of Hope's Table and Café Esperanza, the pay-what-you-can ministry of the Synodically Authorized Worshiping Community in Reading. The Assembly celebrated the 50th anniversary of the ELCA Hunger Appeal (an offering for World Hunger totaled \$2365) and adopted a \$2.3 million synod budget for 2025. Elections were held for Synod Council and for the 2025 ELCA Churchwide Assembly in Phoenix, Arizona, with only two people from our Mission District to be elected to offices: our Mission District's Treasurer, Jim Doxsey (Synod Council), and

Deacon Dawn Tally (Churchwide Assembly), who serves as a Chaplain in the Geisinger health system and teaches at the University of Scranton. We also voted on Resolutions and Constitutional Revisions to update the synod's RIC Affirmation Statement to include racial justice, to change the rules about who can serve as a Mission District Dean, to celebrate the Rite of Ordination for synod Deacons at next year's assembly (it was scheduled for 2020 when the assembly was postponed), to give voice and vote to the newly formed Licensed Lay Ministers at future assemblies, and to create an Archive Committee to work with the synod's archivist. But the time was so short and an electricity blackout just as the assembly resumed after lunch put the agenda so far behind that even the Bishop was unable to give his report, promising instead to video record it and share it later. Please share your thanks with Ray Mancke and Gail Ide for serving as our congregation's delegates and voting members.

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LABYRINTH WALKS

On Wednesday, July 17 and August 21, and on the third Wednesday of each month thereafter, the labyrinth will be

available for anyone from St. Paul's and the public to use from 3:00 -6:00 pm. Gail Ide will be present to offer guidance on walking the labyrinth. Watch for reminders about the labyrinth in church bulletins.

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ELCA Global Mission and LIRS (Lutheran Immigration and Refugee Service) have long been on the forefront (since 1939) of guiding, supporting, and



providing relief for immigrants and refugees. At the 2016 Churchwide Assembly the ELCA adopted the AMMPARO strategy. AMMPARO is an acronym that stands for

Accompanying Migrant Minors with Protection, Advocacy, Representation and Opportunities, and cleverly takes its name from the Spanish version of Psalm 46:1. "Dios es nuestro amparo y fortaleza" ("God is our refuge and strength"). The AMMPARO network grew to include partners across the Americas, from Chile to the United States, that can provide respite and resources for people forced to leave their homes. Yet the number of people displaced globally continues to grow due to conflict, economic shocks, natural disasters and more — and all these hardships have been compounded by COVID-19. In response AMMPARO is expanding to reach more people on the move around the world. The AMMPARO network now includes partners in countries such as:

- Zimbabwe: The Evangelical Lutheran Church in Zimbabwe's Symbols of Hope program is raising awareness about human trafficking and creating job opportunities at home. About 13,000 program participants are learning skills in masonry, sewing, soap-making and more.
- Serbia: The Ecumenical Humanitarian Organization provides shelter and

resources for individuals and families fleeing countries such as Afghanistan and Syria.

In addition to the expansion of the scope of the AMMPARO strategy, ELCA Global Mission recently welcomed two new missionaries: Steffen Riley, serving in Kumamoto, Japan, as an ESL teacher with the Japan-3 (J3) program, and Hannah Kurtz, serving in Cambodia as a country coordinator for Young Adults in Global Mission (YAGM). Also, the Rev. Kristin Engstrom began in her new roles as country representative and as YAGM country coordinator in Madagascar. Thank you for your support of ELCA Global Mission and the important work they do around the world.
