Updates from the October 1, 2024 meeting:

Worship & Music – St. Paul's will exchange communion elements with St. Theresa's on Reformation Sunday; St. Paul's will be including Prince of Peace Episcopal in our weekly prayers; the next Healing Service will be December 11 at Prince of Peace; Christmas Eve services will be held at 4:00 and 7:00 pm (service at 4 pm will also be on Zoom) and we will add more traditional carols during both services. Lessons and Carols service is scheduled for December 29.

Christian Education – Sunday School children will have a special project for Reformation.

Social Ministry – Sunday School children assisted with decorating pumpkins for our homebound members; Sneaker project for Head Start children is on-going.

Property – electrician is needed for several issues throughout the building including replacing bulbs in three parking lot lights.

Finance – all committees should review their budgets and submit proposals for their 2025 budgets by Sunday, October 27.

6261 Discussion – the following is a summary of Council's discussions to date: St. Paul's is entering into this discussion from a position of strength. There is a strong sense of community, and many viable ministries. In addition, a number of initiatives have begun to work with Prince of Peace Episcopal Church. A 6261 Ministry Community would continue to give our congregation the opportunity to review our ministries, and to learn more of the ministries of our fellow Christians. This process will allow St. Paul's to enhance existing ministries and to develop new ones. A 6261 Community will help our ministries reach a larger number of people, to work with other Christians to maintain best practices in our community, and to be able to have additional people to work toward mutual goals. Council's next step is to meet with a Synod representative.

SIMPLE BUT LIFESAVING

In early 2024, Beatrice Johnson became deathly ill in hours. An upset stomach became dangerously low blood pressure; it turned out flesh-eating bacteria had attacked her entire body.

When Johnson's kidneys started failing, she was put on life support. In a last-ditch effort, doctors added sodium bicarbonate — baking soda — to her IV.

Within hours Johnson was noticeably improved, and she left the hospital a month later. "I never thought something so simple would save my life," she said.

Another lifesaver many people find too simple is God's grace. We quip, "If something seems too good to be true, it probably is," and "Nothing in life is free." We're used to payments or paybacks. We balk if a friend offers to buy our lunch. When a neighbor brings us homemade cookies, we don't dare return the plate empty.

So how can something as huge and *holy* as salvation be a free gift from God? Don't we need to *do* something to earn it: follow the 10 Commandments? go to church? live a "godly" life? All those things are good to do, but the key is to do them as *thanks* for God's gift of salvation, not to earn it. Jesus loves you and assures you of eternal life. Just accept the gift! If that seems simple, it's because it is — but it will also save your life.


From Pastor



100th ANNIVERSARY "FUN FACT"

In 1967 a suspended cross (now standing in the Narthex) was built by member Roy Stair and placed over the altar as a gift by Doras in memory of their first teacher, Mrs. John Batey. A parsonage and adjoining building were torn down, a much-needed parking lot was completed and a new front entrance was built. St. Paul's continued to grow, and to grow with a firm link to its beginning and to its traditions. In 1990, as the congregation celebrated its 65th anniversary, skilled organ restoration workers completed badly needed repairs on the organ and added six new ranks of pipes, restoring it to its original musical glory. Thoughtful members now began to consider the needs of the church throughout the rest of the decade, especially its rapidly growing Sunday School and those members who, because they were in wheelchairs, could no longer come to worship. 


VETERANS DAY SALUTE

After fighting in World War II, Luther Bergeland wasn't done serving his country — or his God. The Minnesota farm boy, who "came back to faith" during combat, later served for decades as a military chaplain. For his actions in the field in Korea, Bergeland was awarded the Bronze Star. Then during Vietnam, he served in the Army Reserves in Colorado, tasked with informing family members about soldiers' deaths. Despite the challenges, Bergeland embraces the special role he was able to play for four decades, sharing Jesus and his love with countless people. "That's what we did, preaching and reaching out to people," he told a reporter. "I always liked the military very much because it just did a lot for me, and I hope I did a lot for it."

On Veterans Day, we salute Bergeland and all the men and women who selflessly serve.
