
ST. PAUL'S MISSION STATEMENT

FROM OUR PASTOR

Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

The resurrection of Jesus from the dead is the single most important event in the Christian faith so that it takes a week of weeks plus a day to celebrate. Easter day is the single most attended day in Christian worship, which gives us a hint of the event's

significance. But there's too much to notice, ponder, and celebrate beyond the empty tomb. So, from early days, the church has marked the season of Easter and the significance of the resurrection and appearances of the resurrected Jesus all the way to the 50th day, or Pentecost, when the culmination and consequences of Jesus resurrection reach their promise fulfillment in the pouring out of the Holy Spirit on the whole community of believers. Matthew, Mark, and Luke relate how an angel reports to the women that Jesus "has been raised," or "has risen." However, the church declares "Christ IS risen," acknowledging that we continue to live in the presence of the still-resurrected Lord Jesus to this day. The resurrection is that important, and why every Sunday is ultimately a celebration of the Resurrection. Join in celebrating life - his and ours - in our regular worship of the risen Lord of Life.

The plans for it have been in the works for over a year, but this month will finally bring us the climax of our 100th Anniversary year celebration, the worship and pig roast picnic on Sunday, May 25. There will be no Saturday service that weekend. We are expecting some special guests that day who have been associated with the congregation over the years in a variety of ways. And leading us in worship and preaching will be our Northeastern PA Synod Bishop Christopher deForest. From its beginning, the congregation of St. Paul's Lutheran Church, first in Shavertown and now in Dallas, has been a strong presence in the Back Mountain church community, a marvelous community of disciples of Jesus, and a bold witness of mission and ministry. It's a wonderful opportunity to celebrate our 100-year heritage and to set our sights on continuing that heritage for the next 100 years.

MISSION DISTRICT NEWS

We thank Gail Ide and Marissa Miller for serving as our congregation's voting members at the Scranton/Wilkes-Barre Mission District assembly that was held April 23 and the Northeastern PA Synod assembly to be held Friday and Saturday, May 30-31 at Christ Hamilton United Lutheran Church in Stroudsburg. This will be a significant assembly as the synod is in the process of radical restructuring and re-staffing with a new Strategic Intent. Bishop deForest, the staff, and the synod council have been working since staff and council retreats in January for visioning and re-imagining the mission, purpose, structure, and operations of the synod. Part of the process is already underway with the resignation of Executive Associate of the Bishop, Pr. Rachael Dietz, and the phasing out over the coming months of the seven part-time Associates of the Bishop who serve congregational transitions in Mission Districts, including Pastor Grube. Big changes are coming. Pray for Gail and Marissa and the work of the assembly as well as the synod itself as we adapt to a new era in the church.

Essentials for Parenting

Whether you are a new mom, a new dad, a new grandparent or a new foster parent, the skill of parenting doesn't just come naturally. Parenting is a lot of work, whether they are a toddler, a preschooler or a teenager. Good news, there is help!!

The Center for Disease Control has a printable resource called "Essentials for Parenting." It is a free online resource that can either be read online, printed or shared. Essentials for Parenting includes: Articles with a variety of skills, tips, and techniques. It also has videos featuring parents, children, and parenting experts who demonstrate and discuss skills. There are free print resources like chore charts, and daily schedules.

The topics discussed include tips for communicating with your child, creating structure and rules. How to give directions, tips for discipline and consequences.

It is important to note that not every child and parent are the same. This isn't a one size fits all approach, but hopefully it will give ideas for parenting so that you can make the best decisions for you and your family.


