
ST. PAUL'S MISSION STATEMENT

Updates from the September 2, 2025 meeting:

Pastor's report: The Northeast Pennsylvania Synod has announced new associates for mission districts and the synod council approved a new Indonesian church to be established in Scranton. At its summer assembly, the ELCA appointed a new bishop and a new secretary, and information about these leaders is available on the ELCA website. The assembly also adopted new amendments to its constitution, and since the ELCA constitution serves as a model for St. Paul's constitution, St. Paul's members will have an opportunity to vote on similar changes to our constitution at the January 2026 congregational meeting.

Church Office: Microsoft will end support for its operating system Windows 10 in October, 2025; the office is working on obtaining a quote for updating its computers to Windows 11.

Christian Education: This year's Sunday School theme will be Acts of Kindness, and "Holy Moly" is the name of this year's curriculum. The committee is working on a Prayers Pals project.

Evangelism Committee: Committee members are organizing a church booth for the annual Back Mountain Harvest Festival on Sunday, September 14. The committee suggested that name tags be provided for visitors and newcomers, and council approved the suggestion. Gail Ide welcomes volunteers to work with her in a core group on the Reconciling in Christ project.

Social Ministry: Pat Kowalek has agreed to serve as chair of the committee, and a committee meeting on September 24 at 10:30 am has been scheduled.

Property Committee: The two teak benches are in the process of being cleaned and resealed w/Teak Oil. The sidewalk expansion joints and

the Columbarium mortar repair will be completed before winter. Window sills in the three Head Start Classrooms have been sanded, stained and sealed; window sills in the remaining classrooms will also be addressed in the near future. The limestone caps on the sidewalk lights have been cleaned with a stone cleaner recommended for limestone. After discussing the quote received to repair the lighted sign on the hill facing Rt. 118 (upwards of \$4500) council decided to postpone repairs until more is known regarding the upcoming construction in front of the sign. Council members thanked Smith Blacktop Company and Dan & Paulette Smith for repairing the holes in the church driveway.

100th Anniversary Committee: The outdoor movie on Saturday, August 23 went well. The next anniversary event will be a brunch after worship on Sunday, September 21 at the Greens at Irem. There will be no Sunday School that day. All members of the congregation are encouraged to bring framed photos of deceased loved ones for a display for All Saints Sunday on November 2. The committee also is planning to make the Birthday Party for Jesus, held after the Sunday School Christmas program, the last anniversary event of the year.



EPISCOPAL CHURCH NEWS

We celebrate with our sisters and brothers of Prince of Peace Episcopal Church as they and their Bethlehem Diocese continue the process of joining together with the Diocese of Central Pennsylvania. As part of their reunification, many parishes have taken on sibling parishes. Prince of Peace's sibling parish is Christ Memorial Episcopal Church in Danville, the Reverend Lisa Work, Rector. This reunification of dioceses is a significant and important process, and relationships across the former borders is a helpful way to reunite them. Please include both Prince of Peace and Christ Memorial churches in your prayers.

NEPA SYNOD NEWS

The Northeastern PA Synod is expected to make an announcement later this month about two new staff members. A new Director for Leadership will serve full time in support of pastors, congregations, ministry candidates, and transitions. A new Director for New Ministries will serve a half-time position supporting Synodically Authorized Worshiping Communities (SAWC), new ministry starts, and special ministry services in the synod. Among

their SAWC responsibilities will the new Indonesian Lutheran Church Scranton (ILCS), which received official status as a SAWC by the synod and ELCA at the beginning of September.

ELCA NEWS



Newly elected ELCA Presiding Bishop Yehiel Curry will be installed Saturday, October 4, at Central Lutheran Church, Minneapolis. Our NE PA Synod Bishop Christopher

deForest will be attending. You can join in the worship through a link to the livestream of the installation on the ELCA website (elca.org). As we welcome Bishop Curry and pray for him in his new office, we also celebrate and give thanks for Presiding Bishop Elizabeth Eaton, who served as presiding bishop for two six-year terms 2013-2025 after serving as bishop of the Northeastern Ohio Synod for a full term 2006-2013. She is looking forward to retirement.

In addition to our own ELCA, the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Jordan and the Holy Land elected a new bishop in June. The Rev. Imad Mousa Dawood Haddad was elected bishop. He addressed the 2025 ELCA Churchwide Assembly, speaking of the situation in the Holy Land and the challenges that his church faces. "As Lutherans, our churches are part of the same vine. You, too, are a church called to abide in Jesus and bear fruit," Haddad said. "When you speak clearly about justice for Palestinians, together with other Christian, Jewish and Muslim voices in the Holy Land and around the world, that is bearing fruit." Meanwhile, the recent edition of "Global Links" newsletter also announced that in July ELCA Global Mission welcomed 20 new missionaries serving in 11 different countries. These new global personnel are serving in roles such as pastors, teachers, Seminary Horizon International interns, coordinators and more. Over the two-week orientation event the new missionaries learned about missionary sponsorship, the companion synod program and the cultural context of their countries of service. Additionally, they learned about accompaniment (the ELCA's approach to

global mission) and the MERGE justice principles (migration justice, environmental justice, racial justice, gender justice and economic justice) that influence their work and ministry. Please keep our new missionaries and our companion churches in your prayers.
