



UPDATE FROM NOVEMBER 4 MEETING:

Pastor's Report: On Saturday, Jan. 17, 2026 a meeting will be held at St. Martin in the Fields Episcopal Church in Mountain Top to explore possible 6261 collaboration between local Lutheran and Episcopal churches. The meeting will be led by leaders of the NEPA Synod and is open to all members of our congregation as well as other members of Lutheran and Episcopal churches in the area. Landscaping: The pine tree near the back door was trimmed of its lower branches. Christian Education: Sunday School students recently enjoyed a bonfire on Reformation Sunday and decorated pumpkins for shut-in church members. The committee will hold a turkey decorating contest this month and all church members are invited to decorate a turkey and bring it to the church by November 16. Judging will be held on Sunday, November 23. The committee also is planning an Advent Event on Sunday, November 30 (1st Sunday in Advent) and a Birthday Party for Jesus on Sunday, December 21. **Evangelism:** The walkway for the meditation garden has been poured, and daffodil bulbs have been planted; other plantings are expected to be completed soon. Fellowship: The committee will offer a reception following the Advent Lessons and Carols service on Sunday, December 14 at 3:00 pm. Head Start: On Sunday, November 30 a tree for mittens/gloves, hats/scarves, socks/underwear will be set up; this year the Head Start program is requesting Pull-Up diapers as well. **Property/Finance:** Repairs have been completed to the heating units in the Christian Education wing and Sanctuary; 2026 budget requests are needed from committee chairpersons & 2026 proposed budget will be presented at the December meeting. 100th Anniversary: The committee's final event will be a Birthday Party for Jesus on Sunday, December 21, following worship. Annual Congregational **Meeting:** The meeting will be held on Sunday. January 25, 2026, following worship and a

covered dish lunch. There will be four open seats on council, so anyone interested in running for council is encouraged to contact members of the nominating committee (Don Kretchmer, Tony Linnen, Julie Holbrook, Cathy Ridout). New council members will be elected at the annual meeting.

The season of hope and expectation, waiting and watching for our Lord to come, is upon us. Advent is that four-Sunday season before Christmas in which we anticipate and celebrate Jesus' coming to us as a baby born in Bethlehem, as the judge and redeemer at the end of time, and as our present Lord and Savior in word and sacrament, community and acts of loving service today and every day. His coming is foretold by the prophets, announced by John, and prepared by Gabriel and Mary. These are the characters and events that will mark our worship this season.

SHARED ADVENT WORSHIP

This Advent will include two special events for us and our sister congregation, Prince of Peace Episcopal Church. Our quarterly Healing Service will be Wednesday, December 10 at 7:00 pm at Prince of Peace and will focus our attention on healing from the grief that often comes with the holiday season, when losses of family can be particularly poignant. The second event is a new Service of Lessons and Carols for Advent on Sunday, December 14 at 3:00 pm at St. Paul's. Modeled after the more familiar Christmas Lessons and Carols, this service will feature readings and hymns of the Advent season and will provide our two congregations a new opportunity to gather together for worship and fellowship. We will have a light reception following the service so that we may meet and greet one another. Leaders, readers, and singers

from both congregations will join in leading the service and a combined choir will sing as well. Mark your calendar for this special event.

Please pick up your copy of the Advent Daily Devotions booklet for your personal home use this season. The readings come from the daily lectionary and each reading is followed by a reflection. We are also sharing these booklets with our sister congregation,



Prince of Peace, and with the second parish Father Joe pastors, Trinity Episcopal Church, West Pittston. In addition, Advent calendars for our children and families are also available. "A Stable Lamp Is Lighted" features thoughts, reflections, and activities for each day of December and includes a DIY nativity scene to assemble throughout the season, a different part each day.



Sunday, December 21, will be a big day for us as we gather for the Fourth Sunday of Advent. Worship that day will feature our annual Sunday School Christmas program in the form of a Readers' Theater dramatic reading. You'll have parts too! Then immediately after worship we'll have a Birthday Party for Jesus reception hosted by the Anniversary Committee. Then we will continue our activity with a Hanging of the Greens party and decorate the Sanctuary for Christmas. There will be plenty of jobs to do for people of all ages and abilities, and many hands make light work. We hope you will be part of the festivities! Finally, when we have decked the hall, we'll end our time together with a pizza lunch. Please note that because of the Hanging of the Greens party and Christmas celebration, there will be no Sunday School on December 21 or 28. Regular Sunday School will resume Sunday, January 4, 2026.

Annual Giving Statements

IRS regulations state that for tax purposes, you must be sure your contributions are received no later than December 31. After that date, 2025 contributions received

by St. Paul's in 2026 may be credited to your financial statements only if they are mailed and postmarked in 2025. The IRS also requires that taxpayers receive their financial statement acknowledgments before the date he/she files a tax return. If the taxpayer does not have the acknowledgment by then, the taxpayer cannot claim a charitable deduction.
